Rebuild for the Future

The history of C-on (Zion) Kinshuko Camp and its role in Christian ministry in Japan



C-on Kinshuko Camp is nestled in the lush mountains of Iwate prefecture in Northern Japan. Since the first director, Jim Weber, launched it in 1968, the camp has been serving wide constituencies as one of the few Christian camps in the Northeastern region of Japan.

At its inception, the camp primarily served youth, but presently, it hosts camps that meet the needs of diverse clients, including serene camps for the elderly, and retreats for families and singles. Additionally, since the Great East Japan Earthquake in 2011,

much needed retreats for the Christian workers in the disaster area have been held at C-on Kinshuko Camp. Over the past 46 years, the camp has expanded and has been utilized by people of all ages.

During these 46 years, approximately 80,000 people used the camp, with many of them encountering and accepting Jesus Christ at C-on Kinshuko Camp. Sixty percent of the pastors who serve in the Conservative Baptist Church Association (the organization that owns the camp), as well as many who became overseas missionaries, have either made the decision to believe or have dedicated their lives for full time service to God while at the camp. Countless people have found repose in the gospel, gave and received encouragement, and gained friends for life, through the camp environment filled with God's hospitality and his beautiful creation.

Ever since I was a child, Kinshuko has always been a place of spiritual growth and encouragement for me. I decided to dedicate my life to Jesus at one of the Kinshuko High School Camps that I went to. Currently, I am serving as a missionary in Peru.

The background for the building project

The original camp building, which was built 46 years ago, has not been in use for the past six years due to deterioration and so we have been hosting camps in the annex, in a limited capacity. We began discussion of the new building project ten years ago and have been in desperate need of a new facility since then. Yet, due to lack of funds, we have not been able to launch the building project. Furthermore, the Great East Japan Earthquake in 2011 greatly affected the construction business due to the massive needs for the reconstruction of the disaster zone. Due to a lack of building materials and human resources, the cost for building projects inflated and the laws and ordinances that surround construction became increasingly stringent, making it difficult to obtain permission to begin construction. Even though we have been surrounded by these challenging circumstances, God gave us a construction company that undertook our building project a year ago, in March 2014.

Currently, we can host 45 campers, but with the completion of the new building, we will be able to host up to 90 campers.

We have begun the building project and need your help.

It costs \$840,000 U.S.D., to construct the new building. In response, Christians in Japan have given 100% of the budget. Last June, we demolished the 46-year-old building. We received permission to build and the construction began in March 2015, with the goal to complete the construction by July, in time for the summer camping season. Japan is considered a wealthy nation in Asia, yet with the nationwide economic slump and the small number of Japanese Christians (representing less than one percent of the population) further financial contributions toward the new camp building from Japanese churches is limited. Even so, people have given sacrificially and have met 100% of the budget for the construction of new building. As a member of God's family living outside of Japan, would you consider partnering with us in furthering God's work and reaching the Japanese people for Christ through effective camp ministry? While the budget for the building has been met, we are in need of funding for furnishings, heating and kitchen equipment and landscaping as explained below. God has led us step by step so far and I am confident that God will speak to the hearts of His people in order to meet our financial needs and all the things that are needed to begin a brand new season, starting this summer.
